BIRD MARKING REGISTER

The Register of bird marking projects published in SAFRING 3(2):18-22 is brought up to date below. The conventions followed in that list are used below, for instance TCR indicates that tarsal colour rings are being used. Two lists are given, one of the new projects and the other of changes in status of current projects. Any person whose project status has not been corrected should notify NUBRA.

Any person undertaking a marking project should first notify NUBRA and that no marking technique other than tarsal colour rings, nasel saddles and wing-window marking can be used without permission.

THE SMALLER THE OPENING, THE BIGGER THE BIRD

In many years of catching rails and crakes with walk-in traps, I have caught many birds which one does not expect in a rail-trap.

However, on 10th August, 1975, I experienced my "biggest" surprise: a Spurwing Goose, <u>Plectropterus gambensis</u> had crept into one of my traps. It took Mr. S.T. Madden and myself five minutes to get the bird out of the trap, as this particular trap had the smallest opening of all my traps: 180 x 135 mm.
