AFRING

Introduction:

AFRING was formed as a result of discussions at the 3rd Pan African Crnithalogs as Congress, held in the Yougar National Park, South Africa in September, 1969. The original object was to organise co-operation between binderinging organisations nouth of the Sahara and to achieve as high a dearer of stundardisation in data collection as possible. As a first step, the secretary was requested to prepare a coded check-less of the bind species of the Ethiopian Region and a code for the gragosphical reas of Africa. These codes were finished at the time of the second main rendezvous of Afring members, at a meet on a city under the complete of the international Contributories Congress in the Maine in Sentember, 1970. Apart from adopting the standard Afring codes, the meeting made certain regions to European rise, og schomes:

- to supply Afring with lists of all engineers of binus ringed in Africa, and

Reports on ringing activity to Africa were to be published in the Ring.

If a meeting is considered worthwhile, I expect to circulate a questionnaire to establish the present state of ringing in each member country and to canvass opinion on possible subjects worth discussing.
